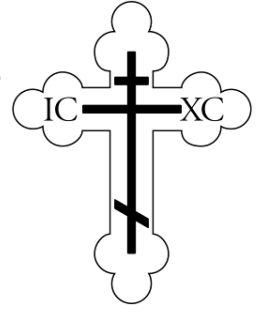
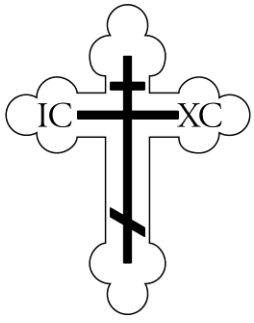

# Synaxis of the Holy Fathers of the Ecumenical Councils

As the Church progressed through history, it was faced with many difficult decisions. The Church always settled difficulties and made decisions by reaching a consensus of opinion among all the believers inspired by God who were led by their appointed leaders, first the apostles and then the bishops.

The first church council in history was held in the apostolic church to decide the conditions under which the gentiles, that is, the non-Jews, could enter the Christian Church (see Acts 15). From that time on, all through history councils were held on every level of church life to make important decisions. Bishops met regularly with their priests, also called presbyters or elders, and people. It became the practice very early in church history that bishops in given regions should meet in councils held on a regular basis.

At times in church history, councils of all of the bishops in the church were called. All the bishops were not able to attend these councils, of course, and not all such councils were automatically approved and accepted by the Church in its Holy Tradition. In the Orthodox Church only seven such councils, some of which were actually quite small in terms of the number of bishops attending, have received the universal approval of the entire Church in all times and places. These councils have been termed the Seven Ecumenical Councils.

O Lord, how manifold are Your works;  
in wisdom have You made them all!

### **Tone 4 – Prokeimenon of the Holy Fathers (Daniel 3)**

Blessed are You, O Lord God of our fathers,  
and praised and glorified is Your Name forever!

### **Epistle: Romans 10.1-10 (Sunday)**

Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they may be saved. For I bear them witness that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. For they, being ignorant of God's righteousness and seeking to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted to the righteousness of God. For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes.

For Moses writes about the righteousness which is of the law, "The man who does those things shall live by them." But the righteousness of faith speaks in this way, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?' (that is, to bring Christ down from above) or, 'Who will descend into the abyss?'" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith which we preach): that if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.

## **Hebrews 13.7-16 (Holy Fathers)**

Brethren, remember those who rule over you, who have spoken the word of God to you. Follow their faith, considering the outcome of their conduct. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Do not be carried about with various and strange doctrines. For it is good that the heart be established by grace, not with foods which have not profited those who have been occupied with them.

We have an altar from which those who serve the tabernacle have no right to eat. For the bodies of those animals, whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest for sin, are burned outside the camp. Therefore, Jesus also, that He might sanctify the people with His own blood, suffered outside the gate. Therefore, let us go forth to Him outside the camp, bearing His reproach. For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the one to come. Therefore, by Him let us continually offer the sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of our lips, giving thanks to His name. But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased.

## **Gospel: Matthew 8.28 – 9.1 (Sunday)**

At that time, Jesus came to the other side, to the country of the Gergesenes, where He met two demon-possessed men, coming out of the tombs, exceedingly fierce, so that no one could pass that way. And suddenly they cried out, saying, "What have we to do with You, Jesus, You Son of God? Have You come here to torment us before the time?" Now a good way off from them there was a herd of many swine feeding. So the demons begged Him, saying, "If You cast us out, permit us to go away into the herd of swine."

And He said to them, "Go." So when they had come out, they went into the herd of swine. And suddenly the whole herd of swine ran violently down the steep place into the sea, and perished in the water. Then those who kept them fled; and they went away into the city and told everything, including what had happened to the demon-possessed men. And behold, the whole city came out to meet Jesus. And when they saw Him, they begged Him to depart from their region. So He got into a boat, crossed over, and came to His own city.

## **John 17.1-13 (Holy Fathers)**

Jesus spoke these words, lifted up His eyes to heaven, and said: "Father, the hour has come. Glorify Your Son, that Your Son also may glorify You, as You have given Him authority over all flesh, that He should give eternal life to as many as You have given Him. And this

is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent.

“I have glorified You on the earth. I have finished the work which You have given Me to do. And now, O Father, glorify Me together with Yourself, with the glory which I had with You before the world was. I have manifested Your name to the men whom You have given Me out of the world. They were Yours, You gave them to Me, and they have kept Your word. Now they have known that all things which You have given Me are from You. For I have given to them the words which You have given Me; and they have received them, and have known surely that I came forth from You; and they have believed that You sent Me.

“I pray for them. I do not pray for the world but for those whom You have given Me, for they are Yours. And all Mine are Yours, and Yours are Mine, and I am glorified in them. Now I am no longer in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to You. Holy Father, keep through Your name those whom You have given Me, that they may be one as We are. While I was with them in the world, I kept them in Your name. Those whom You gave Me I have kept; and none of them is lost except the son of perdition, that the Scripture might be fulfilled. But now I come to You, and these things I speak in the world, that they may have My joy fulfilled in themselves.”

# **Message at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> All-American Council of the OCA From His Beatitude, our Metropolitan Tikhon**

Dear beloved children in the Lord,

I greet you all as we gather in Baltimore this July 18-22, 2022 for the 20th All American Council of the Orthodox Church in America. This Council is an expression of the ongoing life of Christ's Church on the

North American continent and so we prayerfully entrust this gathering to the Holy Spirit, confident that He will guide our common work.

This Council takes as its theme “Becoming Vessels of Grace.” We know from the Apostle Paul that God, the great fashioner of all things, has fashioned us for His glory to become “vessels of mercy, which he has prepared beforehand for glory, even us whom he has called” (Rom. 9:23). It is the calling of all Orthodox Christians to bear the mercy and grace of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ in the vessels of our hearts. Furthermore, it is our sacred privilege to bring this grace with us into a dark and suffering world.

I ask that we all keep this perspective in mind as we do the important work of this Council for the continuous edification of the Church and the further proclamation of the gospel of Christ. This work will take many forms, notably our Plenary Sessions. However, the critical work of this Council does not stop with the meetings and resolutions. Most of all we look forward to our worship and times of prayer. We also ask God’s blessing upon all the presentations, the youth program, and our fellowship together and pray for the Holy Spirit to be ever present with us in our gatherings.

As we begin the work of the 20th All-American Council, I remind you of our Lord’s words: “Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them” (Matt. 18:19). May this Council be a time of up-building, refreshment, and “unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace” (Eph. 4:3) so that we might be stronger vessels of grace, useful for the Lord’s service.
