January 8, 2023 Afterfeast of Theophany St. George the Chozebite

Today we celebrate the Baptismal Liturgy

Saint George the Chozebite was born on the island of Cyprus toward the end of the sixth century. After the death of his parents, he went to Palestine to worship at the holy places. Here he entered into the monastic community of Chozeba between the River Jordan and Jerusalem, and he later became head of this monastery. Saint George presented the monks example in fasting, vigil and physical efforts. Having lived as an angel upon the earth, he died in peace.

From Fr. Alexander Schmemman:

Baptism is the sacrament of forgiveness, not because it operates a juridical removal of guilt, but because it is baptism *into Jesus Christ*, who is the Forgiveness. The sin of all sins—the truly "original sin"—is not a transgression of rules, but, first of all, the deviation of man's love and his alienation from God. The man prefers something—the world, himself—to God, this is the only real sin, and in it all sins become natural, inevitable. This sin destroys the true life of man. It deviates life's course from its only meaning and direction. And in Christ this sin is forgiven, not in the sense that God now has "forgotten" it and pays no attention to it, but because in Christ man has returned to God, and has returned to God because he has loved Him and found in Him the only true object of love and life.

THE ORDER OF THE BAPTISMAL LITURGY

Liturgy begins as usual but in the middle of the Church with the initiates and their sponsors standing by. Special Petitions are added to the Great Litany. The baptismal waters are then consecrated and the Oil of Gladness. The initiates are anointed on the head, heart, shoulders, ears, hands, and feet. At each, the people respond: "Amen!" The initiates are then baptized. Psalm 31 is read as they dry. They are given their baptismal garments, and we sing:

Tone 8 - Troparion of Vesting

Grant unto <u>me</u> the <u>robe of</u> light, O Most <u>Mer</u>ciful <u>Christ our</u> God, who clothe Your<u>self</u> with <u>light</u> as with a <u>gar</u>ment!

Then the **Beatitudes** with the **Little Entrance**, and then we sing the **Hymns of the Day** while the initiates dress.

HYMNS OF THE DAY

Tone 5 - Resurrectional Troparion

Let <u>us</u>, the faithful, praise and <u>wor</u>ship the Word, co-eternal with the Father and the <u>Spir</u>it, <u>born</u> for our salvation from the <u>Virgin</u>; for <u>He</u> willed to be lifted up on the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh, to en<u>dure</u> death, and to <u>raise</u> the dead// by His <u>glo</u>rious Resur<u>rec</u>tion.

Tone 1 - Troparion of Theophany

When You, O Lord, were baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest. For the voice of the Father bore witness to You, and called You His beloved Son; and the Spirit in the form of a dove confirmed the truthfulness of His word. O Christ our God, You have revealed Yourself// and have enlightened the world, glory to You.

Tone 4 – Patronal Troparion

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, il<u>lum</u>ined by your coming, O <u>Mo</u>ther of God.

Beholding your pure image we fervently <u>cry</u> to you:

En<u>comp</u>ass us beneath the precious veil of your pro<u>tec</u>tion.

Deliver us from every form of <u>e</u>vil by en<u>treating</u> Christ, your <u>Son</u> and our God// that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 5 - Resurrectional Kontakion

You de<u>scend</u>ed into hell, O my <u>Sav</u>ior, shattering its gates as Al<u>mighty</u>, resur<u>rec</u>ting the dead as Creator, and de<u>stroy</u>ing the <u>sting</u> of death. You have delivered Adam from the curse, O <u>Lov</u>er of Man,// and we cry to <u>You</u>: "O Lord, <u>save</u> us!"

Tone 4 - Kontakion for St. George

You have appeared as a <u>bril</u>liant light and have illumined with divine rays those who cry to <u>you</u>, O George. Pray for us to Christ the <u>Mas</u>ter, Who appeared in the <u>wa</u>ters// to illumine those <u>born</u> on earth!

Tone 4 - Kontakion of Theophany

Today You have shone forth to the <u>world</u>, O Lord, and the light of Your countenance has been <u>marked</u> on us. Knowing You, we sing Your <u>praises</u>: "You have come and re<u>vealed</u> Yourself,// O unap<u>proach</u>able Light."

The priest meets the newly-illumined in the middle of the Church and annoints them with Holy Chrism: first on the head, then the eyes, the nostrils, the lips, the ears, the heart, the hands, and the feet, saying each time: "The seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit!" and each time the people respond: "Amen!" Then the priest leads them and their sponsors in procession thrice around the baptismal font, as we sing ""As Many as Have Been..." The Divine Liturgy then continues as usual with the Readings.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Tone 1 – Prokeimenon for the Sunday after Theophany (Psalm 32)

Let Your mercy, O Lord, be upon us / as we have set our hope on You!

Tone 3 – Baptismal Prokeimenon (Psalm 26)

The Lord is my light and my Savior; / whom shall I fear?

Epistle: Ephesians 4.7-13 (Sunday after Theophany)

Brethren: To each one of us grace was given according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore, He says: "When He ascended on high, He led captivity captive, and gave gifts to men."

Now this, "He ascended"—what does it mean but that He also first descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is also the One who ascended far above all the heavens, that He might fill all things.

And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ, till we all come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ.

Romans 6.3-11 (Baptism)

Brethren: Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were buried, therefore, with Him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His. We know that our old self was crucified with Him, so that the sinful body might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For

He who has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him. For we know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over Him. The death He died, He died to sin once for all, but the life He lives, He lives to God. So, you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel: Matthew 4.12-17 (Sunday after Theophany)

At that time, Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, and He departed to Galilee. And leaving Nazareth, He came and dwelt in Capernaum, which is by the sea, in the regions of Zebulun and Naphtali, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Isaiah the prophet, saying: "The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, by the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles: The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and upon those who sat in the region and shadow of death Light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

Matthew 28.16-20 (Baptism)

At that time, the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. And when they saw Him, they worshiped Him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Vouchsafe to accept the prayers of the Church, so that by Your goodness, peace may return to all peoples; O Lord, hear us and have mercy.

We also pray You, O Lord our God, to remember and have mercy on our Orthodox brothers and sisters in Russia and Ukraine, who are involved in violent conflict. Remove from their midst all hostility, confusion and hatred. Lead everyone along the path of reconciliation and peace, we pray You, hear us and have mercy.

Instead of "It is Truly Meet..." we sing:

Magnify, O my soul, the most-pure Virgin Theotokos, more honorable than the heavenly hosts.

No tongue knows how to praise you worthily, O Theotokos; even Angels are overcome with awe praising you.

But since you are good, accept our faith; for you know our love inspired by God.

You are the defender of Christians, and we magnify you.

After the Prayer of the Ambo, at "Blessed be the name of the Lord..." the newly-illumined come forward with the sponsors to receive the **Ablution** and **Tonsure**. Then we conclude the Liturgy as normal.

In Memorium: Archpriest Theodore Panchak

Archpriest Theodore Panchak fell asleep in the Lord on the evening of December 30, 2022.
