4th Sunday of Great Lent St John Climacus (of the Ladder)

During Great Lent, we celebrate the Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great (on page 101 of the black Liturgy books)

Saint John Climacus is the author of the spiritual classic *The Ladder of Divine Ascent.* St John was born around the year 525, the son of devout and wealthy parents. He received a very good education, but at the age of sixteen, he forsook the world and went to Mount Sinai, subjecting himself to the spiritual guidance of Elder Martyrios. When he was nineteen years of age, his elder reposed. Then St John entered the arena of hesychasm, visiting the monastic communities of Skete and Tabennise in Egypt. For another forty years, he lived in a cell at Thora in the Sinai Desert, which was a two hour walk from the Monastery of Saint Catherine. Aflame with indescribable longing for God, he ate everything that was permitted by the monastic Rule, but only in very small quantities, and not unto satiety. By so doing, he overcame the vice of pride; and by eating just a little food, he humbled the stomach, which always wants more. He raised his body from death and paralysis by the remembrance of death, and he overcame the tyranny of anger with the sword of obedience.

Who can describe the fountain of his tears, which is now to be seen in very few individuals? He slept only as much as was necessary to prevent his mind from being distracted. Before going to sleep he prayed a great deal, and he also wrote books. This was how he subdued despondency.

After writing *The Ladder* at the request of Igoumen John of Raithu Monastery, and leading a God-pleasing life, St John fell asleep in the Lord when he was about seventy-five years old (ca. 603).

Tone 7 – Resurrectional Troparion

By Your <u>Cross</u> You destroyed <u>death</u>. To the thief You opened <u>Par</u>adise. For the <u>Myrrh</u>bearers You changed weeping into joy. And You commanded Your disciples, O <u>Christ</u> God, to pro<u>claim</u> that You are <u>ris</u>en,// granting the <u>world</u> great <u>mer</u>cy.

Tone 4 – Patronal Troparion

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, il<u>lum</u>ined by your coming, O <u>Mo</u>ther of God. Beholding your pure image we fervently <u>cry</u> to you: En<u>comp</u>ass us beneath the precious veil of your pro<u>tec</u>tion. Deliver us from every form of <u>e</u>vil by en<u>treat</u>ing Christ, your <u>Son</u> and our God// that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 1 – Troparion to St John Climacus

O <u>dwell</u>er of the wilderness and angel in the <u>body</u>, you were a wonderworker, O our God-bearing <u>Fa</u>ther John. You re<u>ceived</u> heavenly gifts through fasting, vigil and <u>prayer</u>, healing the sick and the souls of those <u>drawn</u> to you by faith. <u>Glory to Him Who gave you strength</u>! Glory to Him Who granted you a <u>crown</u>!// Glory to Him Who grants <u>heal</u>ing to all!

Tone 7 – Resurrectional Kontakion

Now the <u>flam</u>ing sword no longer guards the gates of <u>Ed</u>en; it has been mysteriously quenched by the <u>wood</u> of the Cross. The <u>sting</u> of death and the victory of hell have been <u>van</u>quished; for You, O my Savior, have come and cried to <u>those</u> in hell:// "Enter again into <u>Par</u>adise!"

Tone 4 – Kontakion to St John Climacus

The Lord truly set you on the heights of <u>ab</u>stinence, to be a guiding star, showing the way to the <u>u</u>niverse,// O our father and <u>teach</u>er John.

Tone 3 – Patronal Kontakion

Today the Virgin stands in the midst <u>of</u> the Church, And with choirs of saints she invisibly prays to <u>God</u> for us. Angels and bishops <u>wor</u>ship. Apostles and prophets rejoice to<u>ge</u>ther,// Since for our <u>sake</u> she <u>prays</u> to the eternal God.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Tone 7 – Sunday Prokeimenon (Psalm 28)

The Lord shall give strength to His people. The Lord shall bless His people with peace!

Tone 7 – Prokeimenon for St John Climacus (Psalm 149)

Let the saints exult in glory; / let them sing for joy on their couches!

Epistle: Hebrews 6.13-20 (Sunday)

Brethren: when God made a promise to Abraham, because He could swear by no one greater, He swore by Himself, saying, "Surely blessing I will bless you, and multiplying I will multiply you."

And so, after he had patiently endured, he obtained the promise. For men indeed swear by the greater, and an oath for confirmation is for them an end of all dispute. Thus God, determining to show more abundantly to the heirs of promise the immutability of His counsel, confirmed it by an oath, that by two immutable things, in which it is impossible for God to lie, we might have strong consolation, who have fled for refuge to lay hold of the hope set before us. This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast, and which enters the Presence behind the veil, where the forerunner has entered for us, even Jesus, having become High Priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek.

Ephesians 5.9-19 (St John Climacus)

Brethren: The fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness, righteousness, and truth, finding out what is acceptable to the Lord. And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather expose them. For it is shameful even to speak of those things which are done by them in secret. But all things that are exposed are made manifest by the light, for whatever makes manifest is light. Therefore, He says: "Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light."

See then that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil. Therefore, do not be unwise, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not be drunk with wine, in which is dissipation; but be filled with the Spirit, speaking to one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord.

Gospel: Mark 9.17-31 (Sunday)

At that time, one of the crowd answered and said, "Teacher, I brought You my son, who has a mute spirit. And wherever it seizes him, it throws him down; he foams at the mouth, gnashes his teeth, and becomes rigid. So, I spoke to Your disciples, that they should cast it out, but they could not."

Jesus answered him and said, "O faithless generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I bear with you? Bring him to Me."

Then they brought him to Jesus. And when he saw Him, immediately the spirit convulsed him, and he fell on the ground and wallowed, foaming at the mouth.

So, Jesus asked his father, "How long has this been happening to him?"

And he said, "From childhood. And often it has thrown him both into the fire and into the water to destroy him. But if You can do anything, have compassion on us and help us."

Jesus said to him, "If you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes."

Immediately, the father of the child cried out and said with tears, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!"

When Jesus saw that the people came running together, He rebuked the unclean spirit, saying to it: "Deaf and dumb spirit, I command you, come out of him and enter him no more!"

Then the spirit cried out, convulsed him greatly, and came out of him. And he became as one dead, so that many said, "He is dead."

But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him up, and he arose. And when He had come into the house, His disciples asked Him privately, "Why could we not cast it out?"

So He said to them, "This kind can come out by nothing but prayer and fasting."

Then they departed from there and passed through Galilee, and He did not want anyone to know it. For He taught His disciples and said to them, "The Son of Man is being betrayed into the hands of men, and they will kill Him. And after He is killed, He will rise the third day."

Matthew 4.25 – 5.12 (St John Climacus)

At that time, great multitudes followed Him – from Galilee, and from Decapolis, Jerusalem, Judea, and beyond the Jordan. And seeing the multitudes, He went up on a mountain, and when He was seated His disciples came to Him.

Then He opened His mouth and taught them, saying: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when they revile and persecute you, and say all kinds of evil against you falsely for My sake. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad, for great is your reward in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Proclamation concerning the Anniversary of the Repose of St Tikhon from the Synod of Bishops of the OCA

To the clergy, monastics, and faithful of the Orthodox Church in America, beloved children in the Lord,

This year, the Orthodox Church in America marks the 100th anniversary of the repose of Saint Tikhon, Patriarch of Moscow and Enlightener of North America. It is now a full century since this great missionary and churchman fell asleep in the Lord on the feast of the Annunciation (March 25/April 7, 1925), dying as a confessor for the faith under the Soviet yoke.

In celebration of this centennial, the Holy Synod of the Orthodox Church in America has blessed a churchwide celebration of St. Tikhon on the day customarily observed as his feast in many places, October 9, 2025. Under the supervision of the diocesan hierarch, one or more cathedrals in each of our dioceses should mark this occasion with All-night Vigil, Liturgy, and other festive services as may be possible, using whatever accustomed texts may be available. Clergy from throughout each diocese should make every effort to attend such services, and the faithful should be invited and encouraged to join their clergy and hierarchs in common prayer to St. Tikhon, tireless archpastor of North America, architect of our Church, and powerful intercessor before the Lord.

Through the prayers of the holy hieroconfessor Tikhon of Moscow, may we continue to find guidance in his legacy and example.
