HYMNS OF THE DAY

Tone 4 – Resurrectional Troparion When the women dis<u>ciples of the Lord</u> learned from the angel the joyous message of Your Resur<u>rec</u>tion, they cast away the an<u>ces</u>tral curse and elatedly told the a<u>pos</u>tles: "<u>Death</u> is overthrown! Christ God is <u>ris</u>en,// granting the world great <u>mer</u>cy!"

Tone 2 – Troparion for the Sunday of Orthodoxy

We <u>ven</u>erate Your most pure image, O <u>Good</u> One; and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O <u>Christ</u> God. Of Your own <u>will</u> You were pleased to ascend the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh to deliver Your creatures from bondage to the <u>en</u>emy. <u>There</u>fore with thanksgiving we cry a<u>loud</u> to You: "You have filled all with joy, O our <u>Sav</u>ior,// by <u>com</u>ing to <u>save</u> the world."

Tone 1 – Troparion for the 40 Martyrs of Sebaste

Through the <u>suf</u>ferings which Your holy Forty Martyrs endured for Your <u>sake</u>, O Lord,

Tone 4 – Resurrectional Kontakion

My Savior and Re<u>deem</u>er as God rose from the tomb and delivered the <u>earth</u>-born from their chains. He has shattered the <u>gates</u> of hell, and as <u>Mas</u>ter,// He has risen on the <u>third</u> day!

Tone 6 – Kontakion to the 40 Martyrs of Sebaste

You have abandoned all earthly <u>ar</u>mies, cleaving to the heavenly Master, O Forty <u>Mar</u>tyrs of the Lord. Having passed through fire and water, O <u>bless</u>ed ones,// you have fittingly received heavenly glory and <u>ma</u>ny crowns.

Tone 8 – Kontakion for the Sunday of Orthodoxy

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Tone 4 – Prokeimenon for the Sunday of Orthodoxy (Daniel 3)

Blessed are You, O Lord God of our fathers, and praised and glorified is Your Name forever!

Tone 5 – Prokeimenon for the Holy Martyrs (Psalm 11)

You, O Lord, shall protect us and preserve us from this generation forever!

Epistle: Hebrews 11.24-26; 32 - 12.10

Brethren: By faith Moses, when he came of age, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter. He chose to suffer affliction with the people of God rather than enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward.

And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak and Samson and Jephthah, also of David and Samuel and the prophets—who through faith subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the aliens.

Women received their dead raised to life again. Others were tortured, not accepting release, that they might obtain a better resurrection. Still others had trial of mocking and scourging, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned; they were sawn in two, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented – of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, in dens and caves of the earth.

And all these, having obtained a good testimony through faith, did not receive the promise, since God had provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect apart from us. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus—the author and finisher of our faith—who, for the joy that was set before Him, endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

For consider Him who endured such hostility from sinners against Himself, lest you become weary and discouraged in your souls. You have not yet resisted to bloodshed, striving against sin. And you have forgotten the exhortation which speaks to you as to sons: "My son, do not despise the chastening of the Lord, nor be discouraged when you are rebuked by Him; for whom the Lord loves He chastens, and scourges every son whom He receives."

If you endure chastening, God deals with you as with sons; for what son is there whom a father does not chasten? But if you are without chastening, of which all have become partakers, then you are illegitimate and not sons. Furthermore, we have had human fathers who corrected us, and we paid them respect. Shall we not much more readily be in subjection to the Father of spirits and live? For they indeed for a few days chastened us as seemed best to them, but He for our profit, that we may be partakers of His holiness.

Gospel: John 1.43-51 (1st Sunday of Lent)

At that time, Jesus wanted to go to Galilee, and He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me."

Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found the One Moses in the law, and also the prophets, wrote about – Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph."

And Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

Philip said to him, "Come and see."

Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward Him and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no deceit!"

Nathanael said to Him, "How do You know me?"

Jesus answered and said to him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you."

Nathanael answered and said to Him, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!"

Jesus answered and said to him, "Because I said to you, 'I saw you under the fig tree,' do you believe? You will see greater things than these." And He said to him, "Most assuredly, I say to you, hereafter you shall see heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."

Matthew 20.1-16 (Holy Martyrs)

The Lord spoke this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. Now when he had agreed with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And he went out about the third hour and saw others standing idle in the marketplace and said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and whatever is right I will give you.' So they went.

"Again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour, and did likewise. And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing idle, and said to them, 'Why have you been standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and whatever is right you will receive.' "So when evening had come, the owner of the vineyard said to his steward, 'Call the laborers and give them their wages, beginning with the last to the first.' And when those came who were hired about the eleventh hour, they each received a denarius. But when the first came, they supposed that they would receive more; and they likewise received each a denarius.

"And when they had received it, they complained against the landowner, saying, 'These last men have worked only one hour, and you made them equal to us who have borne the burden and the heat of the day.' But he answered one of them and said, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong. Did you not agree with me for a denarius? Take what is yours and go your way. I wish to give to this last man the same as to you. Is it not lawful for me to do what I wish with my own things? Or is your eye evil because I am good?' So the last will be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen.'"

We pray, O Lord our God, for all those who suffer from acts of war, especially the victims in Ukraine, Russia, Israel, and Palestine. We pray for Your peace and Your mercy in the midst of the great suffering of Your people. Vouchsafe to accept the prayers of the Church, so that by Your goodness, peace may return to all peoples; O Lord, hearken and have mercy.

Tone 2 – Troparion of Orthodoxy Sunday

We <u>ven</u>erate Your most pure image, O <u>Good</u> One; and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O <u>Christ</u> God. Of Your own <u>will</u> You were pleased to ascend the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh to deliver Your creatures from bondage to the <u>en</u>emy. <u>There</u>fore with thanksgiving we cry a<u>loud</u> to You: "You have filled all with joy, O our <u>Sav</u>ior,// by <u>com</u>ing to <u>save</u> the world."

Priest: The Church of God has established that on this day we give yearly thanksgiving to God and reaffirm the dogmas of piety. Therefore, following the sayings of the prophets, honoring the exhortations of the apostles, and being instructed by the histories of the Gospels, we celebrate this day of consecration. For Isaiah says: "Be

consecrated to God, you islands," by which he means the churches of the many nations, which are not the structures and embellishments of the temples, but rather the gathering of the faithful who serve God with hymns and praise. The Apostle also exhorts us "to walk in newness of life" and that the "new creation in Christ" be renewed. For He has delivered us who are unworthy from adversity, redeeming us from those who afflicted us. And He has established the free proclamation of piety, the veneration of icons, and this Festival which brings all of us salvation. For in the icons we see what our Master bore for us: the Cross, the grave, hell slain and pillaged; we see the trials of His witnesses and their crowns of salvation, which our First Prize-giver and Contest-master and Crown-bearer wrought in the midst of the earth. Today we celebrate this festival; we rejoice together with prayers and processions, and we cry out with psalms and hymns:

Choir: Who is so great a God as our God? You are the God, who alone does wonders!

Priest: For You overthrew those who slighted Your glory and showed them to be cowards and fugitives who were disrespectful and impudent against the icons. Therefore, as the prophets have seen, as the apostles have taught, as the Church has received, as the teachers have set forth in dogmas, as has been made known to the whole world, as Grace has shone forth, as the truth was demonstrated, as falsehood has been banished, as wisdom emboldened, as Christ has awarded: thus we believe, thus we speak, thus we preach Christ our true God and His saints, honoring them in words, in writings, in thoughts, in sacrifices, in temples, and in icons, worshipping and respecting Christ as God and Master and honoring the Saints with relative adoration, because of our common Master, for they are His genuine servants.

People: This is the Faith of the apostles! This is the Faith of the fathers! This is the Faith of the Orthodox! This is the Faith that has established the world!
